A *School-Parent Compact for Achievement* is an agreement that parents, students and teachers develop together. It explains how parents and teachers will work together to make sure all our students reach grade-level standards.

Effective compacts:

- Link to goals of the campus improvement plan
- Focus on student learning skills
- Describe how teachers will help students develop those skills using high-quality instruction
- Share strategies parents can use at home
- Explain how teachers and parents will communicate about student progress
- Describe opportunities for parents to volunteer, observe, and participate in the classroom

Teachers, Parents, Students – Together for Success

In The Classroom

Our 3rd grade team will work with students to develop skills that assist in higher order thinking and problem solving while reading and working math problems.

- We will increase our reading levels, fluency, and comprehension through our guided reading and literature clubs.
- We will review homework daily to monitor students understanding and mastery of each objective.
- We will reinforce basic facts and spiral through learned objectives to keep our learning fresh in our minds.
- We will also be giving weekly assessments over learned objectives to assess student's mastery of objectives.

At Home

Use daily folders to discuss your child's behavior and check for homework to be completed.

- Read 20 minutes with your child every night and ask your child questions for understanding. By asking about their reading, you are holding them accountable for their reading.
- Sign and return Reading Log daily.
- Discuss/Review math homework to support your child's understanding and mastery of math concepts.
- Work nightly on addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. This will help your child master the concepts being taught in the classroom much faster.

Tradewind Elementary students joined staff and parents to develop ideas about how they can succeed in school. We thought of the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and school:

- Together throughout the year students, parents, and staff will work with our students to create and achieve goals that will improve behavior and performance. By implementing and daily use of these goals can help show importance of learning at home and school. When students take responsibility for their learning, success in all areas is inevitable.
- Set goals for myself to learn and use new words from my reading at least 20 minutes every day.
- Share and discuss my nightly reading with my family to display understanding.
- Share my grow and glow folder, so I can be proud of my success or my area of weakness.
- Help make the grocery list and estimate how much the food will cost.
- Use new vocabulary on a daily basis.
